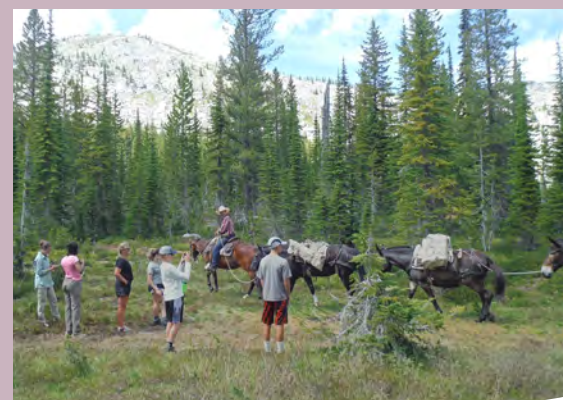
Jostling side to side as the van wound through the mountains, we had no idea what lay ahead. Our eyes searched this new landscape hungrily, sweeping over the blue expanse of mountains far in the distance. Right outside the windows, purple, yellow, and orange wildflowers sprinkled the old fire scars with life. Finally, after two days, 24 hours of driving, and 6 states, we were almost in the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness.

Our mix-and-matched group of Iowa teenagers was brimming with excitement at the smell of pine and the slew of tools we had just strapped to our packs. Soon all the preparation had come to an end and it was time to hike. We began our journey jauntily, with fresh spirits as well as shoulders and feet. The first half mile was smooth sailing: slightly downhill on a two-track with a beautiful view. Then, as the incline began, it soon became apparent that this trek was going to be a challenge. *Continued on pg 6*

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A Note from the Director



A Grand Opening – Kent Park Lake

I hope you can all come join us to help celebrate the lake restoration project at Kent Park! Officials from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and Stanley Consultants will also be on hand to help answer questions and talk about lake restoration strategies. The date is Saturday, September

21st, and activities will be on-going from 1:00 pm until 4:30 pm. The afternoon itinerary is listed on page 5 of this newsletter.

In addition to the opening remarks at the boat ramp parking area, we will be providing hay rack tours of the 9 new ponds or catch basins; Paul Sleeper, IDNR Fisheries Biologist, will have a boat on the lake and show people live fish and talk about fisheries management; Natural Resource staff will provide guided tours of the new bio-cells and water quality monitoring demonstrations, and Naturalists will lead guided walks around the lake trail. If you have any questions about the past, present, or future of Kent Park Lake, you don't want to miss this!

Restoration of the lake took 5 years! This included 2 years of water quality monitoring to identify the issues, one year of planning, and two years of construction. The results are tremendously improved water quality and better opportunities for canoeing, kayaking, fishing, swimming, and just hanging out around the lake. We have many things to show you, and several are "leading edge" in terms of improving water quality and providing habitat for aquatic life.

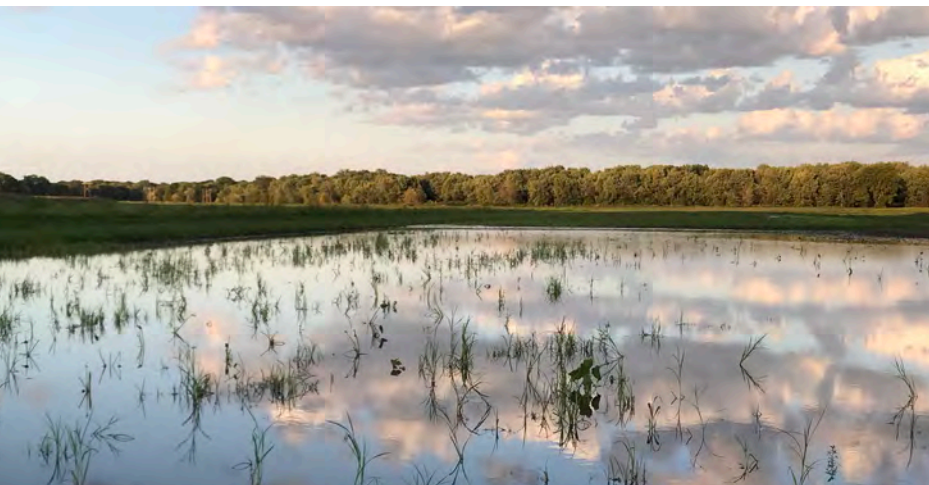

A phrase I learned on this trip was "Type two fun." This means that your experience in the moment is mentally and physically difficult and painful, but afterwards, it is the best thing ever because you overcame the challenge and accomplished something huge. My trek mates and I definitely had some type two fun, along with plenty of type one fun, throughout the trip. This new kind of fun was made even more rewarding because we experienced it together.

Our first encounter with mental and physical challenge came while climbing Friday Pass. The pass was situated about two miles from our campsite: one mile straight up, one mile down. It was early afternoon on our first day of hiking with full packs, and many of us were beginning to feel some aches, pains, and hotspots. The trail, a mix of rough tumbles of boulders along a creek bed and dusty switchbacks, was heavily fringed with mountain heather. About halfway up, glacier lilies poked through the lingering snow, and its meltwater trickled down the trail. I started hiking upwards with a group of four or five other girls, whom I was just beginning to get to know. We were positive, confident, and determined to work hard together.

"We can make it to the next switchback without a rest!" "Look how far we've gone – we can do this!" "You are strong. Keep going."

As we ascended, the altitude made itself known in our lungs and in our legs. Over time, we began to split up. I found myself hiking upwards, alone.

I can remember distinctly how the pack jammed into my tender hips and made me cry. Yet I also remember stopping and looking at the lake and trees below me with breathtaking wonder. And I clearly remember my trekmates climbing steadily above me and below me, occasionally shouting down encouraging words to those behind them. We made it alright. We made it to the top of Friday Pass and it was the best feeling in the world.

Later that evening we gathered together to share our feelings from the day: our roses, buds and thorns. As my friends reflected upon those ups and downs, I heard many of them, including me, share the same thought:

"That was the hardest thing I've done in my life."

The pain, the tears, the camaraderie, the mountains, the flowers, the snow, the feeling when you finally take your pack off ... it was fun. It was the kind of fun that gives you strength and confidence, and a deeper connection to your body, the earth, and the people around you. That first time I made it to the top of Friday Pass, I joked that it takes some crying to get up a mountain. After a week in the Selway-Bitterroot wilderness and many more laughs, adventures, and life-changing challenges, I realized that it is also the support from the people you share the pain with, that gets you up that mountain.

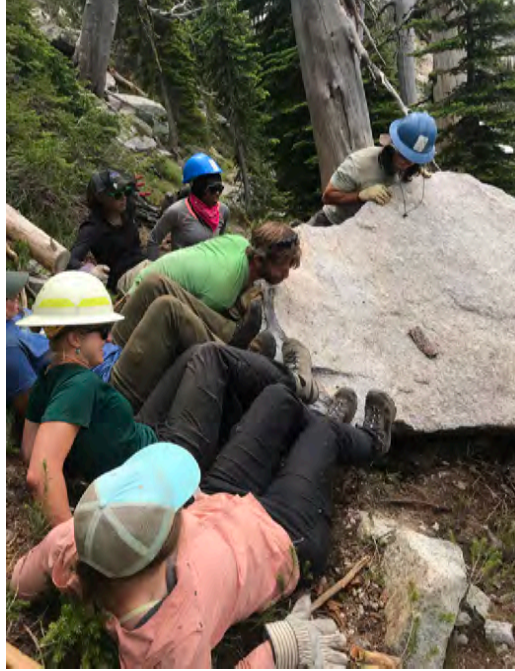

Volunteer Highlight



We're lucky to live in a community that is so passionate and engaged in the conservation mission. Each year, volunteers give back in a multitude of ways, from helping with events, to taking care of the education animals while staff is away, to keeping the Conservation Education Center (CEC) open on weekends, and more. Volunteers also help by using their skills to create new resources for JCC. This fall, we have several such projects to recognize.



Roving Platform, built by Eagle Scout Jason Lang: For an Eagle Scout project, Jason built a roving collapsible platform for the CEC. The platform will host rotating activities designed especially for our youngest visitors. At times, the platform will host a play-campsite and reading nook, complete children's nature books. Other times, the space will host an observation table with microscopes and nature artifacts to explore. Some weeks will feature animal tracking stamps and scavenger hunts. The JCC education staff have been dreaming of such a space for a couple years, and Jason did a terrific job making a product that worked with a tight space.

Chair Covers, made by Iowa Master Naturalist (IMN) Chris Olney:

This spring, IMN graduate Chris Olney went above and beyond to craft beautiful chair covers for the bird blind in Kent Park. Each colorful cover includes two pockets, one for retired JCC bird guides and another for a notebook (some young visitors have already left us drawings of their bird observations!). The cherry on top is the bird decal attached to each cover!

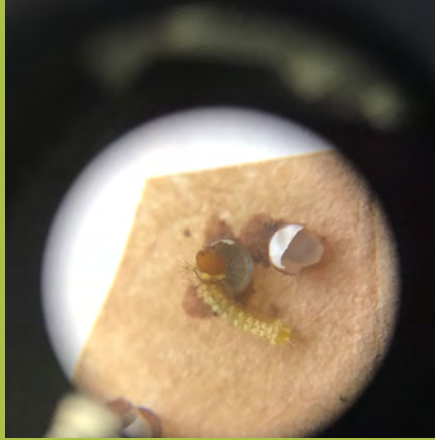

THE INVASION OF THE CATERPILLARS

If you came out to the Education Center at F.W. Kent Park this summer, you might have noticed some black mesh bags hanging from a few of the surrounding trees. Each of these bags held one or more caterpillars that would transform into a species of silk moth (Polyphemus, Cecropia, or Luna moths). Silk moths get their name from the fine silk they use to weave their cocoons. We use silk from different species of moths to make fine silk threads for fabric and clothing.

Iowa has several species of native silk moths including the Cecropia Moth, the largest insect in North America! Some of these caterpillars will still be growing through September, so if you are interested in seeing them, you should come out to the Conservation Education Center. Look for the mesh bags and educational tags which label them! Watch out for more caterpillars next summer.

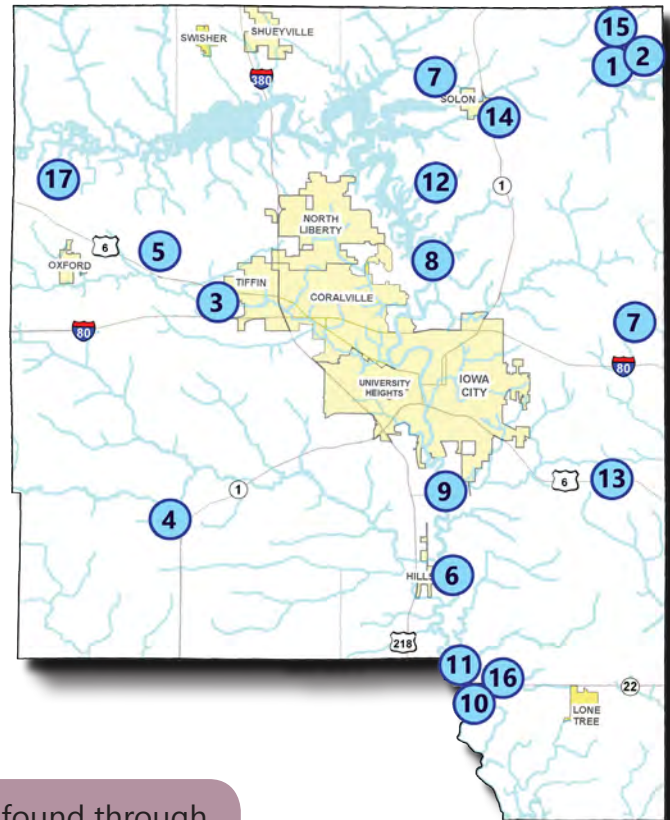
